ANAHEIM CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT STUDENTS MAKE SLIGHT GAINS ON CALIFORNIA STANDARDS TEST

Results from the 2010 California Standards Test (CST) showed that overall student performance in Anaheim City School District made slight gains in both language arts and math at nearly all grade levels tested. The overall District score in language arts was 42% of students meeting standards and 53% in math. In 2nd grade, language arts scores dropped from 41% to 39% from last year to this year. A similar drop also occurred in 3rd grade with the percentage of proficient students moving from 29% to 27%. However, slight gains were seen in grades 4 (49% to 50%), 5 (41% to 44%), and 6 (45% to 47%). In math, the District scores followed a similar pattern. Both 2nd and 3rd experienced a decrease in test scores moving from 56% to 53% and 55% to 53% respectively. All of the upper grades increased scores with 4th scoring 57% to 60%, 5th grade 46% to 53%, and 6th grade 42% to 47%.

Congratulations to the Franklin family for outstanding gains on our CST scores. Franklin students once again had the highest number of students reaching proficiency in math (66%) and increased the number of students scoring proficient or advanced to 52% in language arts. Our API score is now 811! I am very proud of all of our students and staff members for t heir hard work and dedication on the California Standards Tests. Way to go Franklin School!

Superintendent Jose Banda attributed the improvement in the upper grades to a variety of factors, including professional staff development in literacy, cultural competence and focused work with bilingual students. He also cited the increase in family involvement, staff collaboration and use of data to inform instruction. "We applaud these achievements in reading and math and will continue to work until every child is successful," Banda said.

While year-to-year comparisons are important, trends over the long-term are the best indicator of student progress. A review of scores over the five-year period 2005 to 2010 shows that Anaheim City students continue to make sustained and significant improvements. "We test different groups of students from year-to-year, so we expect to see scores fluctuate. That's why we focus on results over time and that picture clearly illustrates sustained and significant improvement," said Superintendent Jose Banda. "This trend demonstrates that the hard work and commitment of our students, teachers, aides, principals and staff – as well as families and community organizations – is leading to success."



ANAHEIM CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT PLACES BOND FOR FACILITIES ON THE NOVEMBER BALLOT



On November 2, 2010, voters in the Anaheim City School District will consider a school facilities bond for \$169.3 million to fund the modernization of nine school sites. The schools remaining to be modernized include Gauer, Guinn, the former Key site, Madison, Marshall, Olive, Roosevelt, Stoddard and Sunkist. The bond tax rate is \$19.98 per \$100,000 assessed value (AV). The average assessed value of a home in Anaheim is \$378,000 and the yearly bond amount equates to approximately \$75 per year. Should the bond pass at the required 55% or more, the funds will allow for eight of the sites to be modernized including safety

upgrades, new plumbing and electrical systems, HVAC, technology, library, and playground equipment. One of the nine sites would be a complete reconstruction and there would be enough construction dollars to build one two-story building to alleviate overcrowding.

"Many parents and citizens don't realize that ACSD still has five schools on multi-track schedules," comment Superintendent Jose Banda. "In addition, some of our single track schools were very close to becoming multi-track schools again. However, through boundary adjustments and the increase in class size, two were saved from that fate." In fact, the District currently has 1,000 more students than originally projected a few years ago. While ACSD enrollment was initially on a decline, it did not decrease as much as expected and in fact has slowly started to climb again these last two years.

While several classified employees were laid off due to the state budget deficit, and there are fewer custodians, office staff, librarians and technology assistants, these modernizations have an expected building life of 40 or more years. When the state economy recovers, many of these positions could be rehired. It is also important all students and staff across the District have access to the same high-quality and safe facilities as the sites that have completed modernization.

"What is important to remember is that these bond dollars will help our local economy and can not be taken by the state," says Superintendent Banda. "They also can not be used to pay administrators and we will continue to have a citizens' oversight committee monitor these funds and the work of our capital construction program."
