Odyssey of the Mind is an international educational program that provides creative problem solving opportunities for students kindergarten through college. Team members apply their creativity to solve problems that range from building mechanical device to presenting their own interpretation of literary classics. They then bring their solutions to competition on the local, state an World level. Thousands of teams from throughout the U.S. and from about 25 other countries participate in the program. Odyssey of the Mind is completely run by volunteer parents.

Last winter four teams from the Tahoe Truckee area formed and participated in Odyssey of the Mind at our regional tournament is Sacramento in March. Those students from GES and ACMS did amazingly well and learned a great deal about creative problet solving.
