#### **Newbury History 101**

# Article Five Parker's Legacy

Rev. Parker lived long enough to hear of one more outrageous scuffle in the meetinghouse. On March 27, 1677, at the county court session in Salem, "Joshua Richardson, Caleb Richardson, and Edward Ordway were sentenced to be severely whipped or pay a fine of ten pounds each, for breaking into the meetinghouse, demolishing pew chairs and so forth." The selectmen had given several women permission to build a new seat in the corner of the gallery, and whether out of personal spite or involvement in a family dispute, at least three young men broke into the meetinghouse by breaking the windows, and destroyed the new seat. Prominent members of the town petitioned to have their fines reduced, since the new seats were not acceptable to many members of the congregation, and the town voted not to allow the women to rebuild them. One month later, secure at least in the knowledge that he was not the sole cause of unrest in the Newbury congregation, Rev. Parker died at the house he had shared with his nephew James and his wife Sarah Noyes and their children for over

One of the many valuable services that Rev. Parker provided during his lifetime was the preparation of exceptional students to attend Harvard. Though there had been a grammar school as early as 1639, it was particularly difficult to keep schoolmasters employed, since their pay came primarily from the students' parents; thus it was an unreliable income, and difficult work. As early as 1652, there was something like a school board set up "for managing the business of the school," and the town voted to pay a schoolmaster in part from town taxes. In 1658, however, Newbury was fined for not having an appropriate school, and ordered to pay Ipswich for the education of their children.

In 1676, the town appointed Henry Short to keep school for a year, and allowed him the use of the "watch house." Though there are no records of where the watch house stood, or indeed what it looked like, it was probably not part of the "watch" set up on Old Town Hill, as that location was then far from the center of town. The watch house appears in the town records first as a place where school was taught and later as a jail, and was probably set up somewhere close to the meetinghouse. Henry Short declined the use of the building, however, and taught seventeen students at his house. This arrangement apparently did not suit him, and the following year Newbury was again hunting for a schoolmaster. All along, Rev. Parker tutored students in Latin and Greek, and many young men from Newbury attended Harvard.

#### Founder's Day at NES - May 6, 2010



Costumes play in important role in helping students place themselves in the past and experience the colonial era. Please do not feel that you have to be able to sew or buy a whole new outfit. The following instructions are geared toward using what you may already own.

#### Costuming suggestions for men and boys:

- Shirt: any plain white shirt, turtleneck, or sweatshirt
- Breeches: knee-length pants were in fashion, so take a dark pair of pants or sweatpants and roll them up to the knees.
- Stockings: use plain colored knee-socks which will fit up under the breeches. Athletic socks without stripes are good.
- Shoes: Any plain dark shoe, but try not to wear sneakers. Buckles can be added made out of cardboard covered with aluminum foil.
- Accessories:
  - Vest: A sleeveless vest adds warmth to the costume
  - Hat: A straw or tricorn hat also helps keep you warm. Please no baseball caps!

#### Costuming suggestions for women and girls:

- Basic dress: Long plain dresses or long plain skirts with white shirts. Could accessorize with a white apron, extra petticoats, shawls and knee socks for added warmth.
- Mob cap: No females went without caps in the colonial days. Cut a circle about1.5-2 ft. in diameter from an old sheet or piece of white material. About two inches from the edge, string ribbon/yarn into gathers to fit the child's head and knot at the ends to secure.
- Shoes: any plain dark shoe, but try not to wear sneakers.
- Accessories:
  - Fichu: this important accessory is a large neckerchief worn around the neck. Fold a scarf, shawl, or blanket into a triangle and place around the neck, down across the front of the dress and bring the ends around the back of waist and knot or tucks into the front waist.
  - Waistcoat: a sleeveless vent in a plain color will add warmth to the costume.

# Extended Day Childcare Programs Pre-Registration 2010-2011

The Triton Regional School District is pleased to announce pre-registration for the Kids Club programs for the 2010-2011 school year. All of our extended day childcare programs will be coordinated and implemented by the district. Pre-registration of students will assist us in our program planning, structure, and staffing. After we receive completed pre-registrations, and are able to assess needs, you will receive a registration form for next year's programs sometime in April. Once program slots are filled on a first come, first served basis, remaining children will be placed on a wait list. Our extended day childcare programs will begin on the first day of school.

If you wish to pre-register your child for our district *Early Bird* and/or *Kids Club* programs please provide the information requested on this Pre-Registration Form and return to your child's school office or email to Kate Arsenault karsenault@trsd.net.

Tuition assistance will be available to families that provide the necessary information and qualify. Your child's extended day slot will be reserved for him/her for the year. The number of reserved slots will help in determining staffing and supply needs. Therefore, as in private childcare programs, you will be billed at the same rate monthly regardless of attendance. Snow days are made up at the end of year, while delayed opening starts will be adjusted for the Early Bird program.

\*The specific day of the week for early release days has not been determined as yet.

<sup>\*</sup> A separate registration will be giving to all children that have registered for the ½ day program within the first 2 weeks of school. The registration will include all ½ day dates. Parents/guardians must sign up for all or individual half days. You will be charged for all days that are registered for.
